Spring Planting tips! Spring is a good time to plant trees and shrubs so they become established before the heat of the summer. It's time to clean your garden and remove all the debris. Get rid of weeds, making sure that you get the roots so they won't grow back. Plant summer annuals after the last frost date. In our area it's after May 15. Dead head spring bulbs, but allow the foliage to remain to nourish the bulbs for next year's display. Trim and thin summer blooming shrubs such as butterfly bush, hydrangea, and most roses. Prune spring blooming shrubs and trees after flowering. Think about adding mulch. One to three inches of mulch helps to prevent weeds and diseases. It also keeps in moisture and maintains the temperature. It's wise to plant your garden or container garden near to the house. For one, the plants are more likely to be seen and cared for and more importantly, grabbing a handful of lettuce or some fresh herbs for tonight's dinner is much easier when it doesn't require walking to the far corner of the yard.

Dumont Shade Tree Commission is accepting applica-




tions from specific neighborhoods to participate in the Adopt-A-Tree program. If accepted, certain homes within a chosen neigh-

The Arboretum Walkway

Take a walk from Madison to New Milford Avenues and admire the peace and beauty that now occupies a space that was once a virtual wasteland on the side of the tracks. The Dumont Shade Tree Arboretum is about 800' long with over 60 Tree Species, many Knock-out Roses, Ilex, Boxwood, Spring Bulbs, Perennials & Butterfly Garden. Thanks to all who have donated hours to create the space for all residents to enjoy. This is a public space, you can plan a public event with your group at this wonderful space or just come, read a book, have a coffee, sit and enjoy the trees now flowers, thanks to the Garden Committee. Please do not litter, take nothing but pictures, leave nothing but footprints.

Dumont Tree Ordinance:



In continuing the effort to protect the trees in our town, the Borough of Dumont has passed an amendment to the Shade Tree ordinance. A permit is now required before ANY tree greater than 6 inches in

caliper or 10 feet in height can be removed within the Borough of Dumont. This ordinance applies to trees on private property and to town trees. Before any tree can be removed, the homeowner or contractor needs to get a permit from the Building Department.

There is a fee of \$25.00. Following the application for a permit, the Dumont Shade Tree Commission will inspect the tree to certify the jurisdiction of the tree and determine if the tree is on private property and therefore can proceed.

The application process will be completed within 5 days of the application request.
