The Shade Tree has worked towards and

secured a generous **NJ Urban & Community Forestry (NJUCF) Achievement Award NJUCF Stewardship Grant** from the NJDEP Division of Parks and Forestry New Jersey Forest Service to conduct a tree inventory. The RFPs were sent out to several vendors who submitted proposals. Final selection is to be announced early spring with the project to be conducted over the summer 2022. So if you see teams out there counting trees...you know it's your DSTC at work! The inventory will help us monitor our urban canopy and continue to plant the right trees in the right place!

Our Tree Nursery will be well watered this summer thanks to the efforts of Ray Slaman who managed to find two **used 275 gallon water tanks** that can be filled once or twice a month through the hot summer months. The trees will get to drink and our nursery volunteers will have a much easier time of it.

Dumont Tree Nursery

In 2017 the DSTC established a tree nursery for the benefit of Dumont residents. The Shade Tree Nursery, located just north of the Dumont Arboretum along the railroad tracks is growing trees for our community. Dumont residents can submit requests and if accepted, will receive a free tree to be planted by the Shade Tree Commission. We will review the available trees and recommend the right tree for the right spot at the right time in their yard. Trees that are available include: flowering dogwood, Washington hawthorn, star magnolia, eastern red cedar, pekin lilac tree, tulip tree, and bur oak. These saplings were raised in the tree nursery and will be available to homeowners for FREE to plant on their property. Sign up for a chance to receive your FREE TREE. Bricks for the Arboretum

The Buy-a-Brick program has been a solid success in Dumont. We thank those many residents who have purchased a brick; some folks have purchase several bricks! These bricks have been installed in front of the Gazebo as part of our ongoing campaign. Take a walk through the Dumont Arboretum and as you pass through the Gazebo area, you will see how many residents have participated in the program. Proceeds help fund the Shade Tree Scholarship for a graduating senior from Dumont High school. This scholarship fund is established for the purpose of fostering education or contributions related to shade trees. Applicant must be accepted to an eligible institution as a candidate for degree, or be pursuing a career, in forestry, agriculture, landscape architecture, environmental sciences, earth sciences, botany, or any other field of study related to shade trees. The money also funds other leafy projects around town.



Adopt-a-Tree Program || Free for Dumont Residents

Homeowners can apply to the Adopt-A-Tree program at any time. The Shade Tree commission will purchase and plant trees at no cost to the homeowner. Adopt-A-Tree is for planting along the curb as a Borough Tree. Planting trees in the Borough Right of Way is the sole responsibility of the DSTC. Property Owners may apply to the Dumont Shade Tree Commission to voluntarily plant a Tree or Trees in the ROW abutting the Private Property. Once planted, the homeowner must agree to water and watch over the new trees.

After applying to participate in the Adopt-a-Tree program we will inspect the location near your home for just the right tree; we will look for underground sprinklers, overhead wire locations, nearest trees, adjacent sidewalks, driveway or other hard surfaces, and any structures. This will help us determine the right tree to plant. Utility mark-outs will also be ordered prior to planting.

Generally planting is done once in the Spring and once in the Fall. When the trees are planted, they are mulched properly "like a donut or dish, not a volcano!" and a watering bag is provided, so that the homeowner can fill it with a hose or watering can (1-3 times per week, more during the first hot or dry summer). Then the water will drip slowly down to the roots to encourage a healthy start to the tree. distributed free of charge. Daisy Troop 7812 will help box and hand out the plants! The milkweed plant is the only plant that monarch butterflies will lay their eggs on and the ONLY plant that monarch caterpillars will eat. Their habitat


Ray had to study for and then pass the rigorous written and field tests. These comprehensive tests are a comprehensive review of New Jersey trees. Ray had to be able to identify and name hundreds of trees by their bark, leaves, nuts, and features. In addition, he had to know their common as well as scientific names. Now that Ray is a certified LTE. His license is NJ LTE #710.

He continues his studies learning about trees and protecting our urban forest. This will help in the work we do as a Shade Tree Commission and lend credibility for managing and protecting the trees in Dumont.

Dumont Shade Tree Commission Honors and Memorials

The Shade Tree Commission believes that it is one of our mandates to honor and memorialize those residents who have made special contributions to our community related to the borough in some way. The Shade Tree will plant a tree in Memorial Park for those who served in our armed forces. If you walk the path in Memorial Park, take a moment to read the



plaques on several of the trees. It is also the Shade Tree plan to plant a tree and honor those we lost because of Covid-19 during the pandemic. We are exploring several locations and will announce the final decision with a date for the special service and planting.

One special person we lost in 2019 was Mr. Timothy D. Sullivan. The plaque for his memorial is at the arboretum. Timothy Sullivan was a dedicated longtime employee of the Dumont DPW. He started his career in 1988 and retired in 2016. A plaque was placed on Westshore Avenue along the railroad tracks within the arboretum in his honor. Everyone who knew Tim knew that he loved trains and so it was a fitting place to honor his memory.

Dumont Tree Ordinance:



In continuing the effort to protect the trees in our town, the Borough of Dumont has an amended Shade Tree ordinance; Ordinance 1503 6/21/16. By law, any resident must apply for a permit—\$25.00 fee —through the Building Department before ANY tree greater than 6 inches in caliper or 10 feet in height can be removed within the Borough of Dumont. This ordinance applies to trees on private

property and to town trees. Following the application for a permit, the Dumont Shade Tree Commission will inspect the tree to certify the jurisdiction of the tree and determine if the tree is on private property and therefore can proceed. Failure to apply for a permit prior to removing a tree will result in a fine. Removing or damaging a borough tree will result in penalties. Our goal is to preserve the canopy in Dumont. The canopy protects all Dumont homes during winter and summer by providing shade and absorbing water. 
