This Fall newsletter is being published as leaves are changing to their brilliant autumn colors in the Northeast. To provide a broader audience and save paper (and therefor trees) the last several editions have been published in a digital format, only. We encourage you to share this newsletter among your friends, family, and neighbors. This newsletter recaps and highlights the Shade Tree activities and projects throughout the season. We hope you enjoy reading about your Shade Tree Commission. We also encourage you to join us if you have time to spare and want to contribute in any way to help support our mission of caring for and planting trees in our community. Our volunteer community works to maintain the **Dumont Arboretum**. Volunteers at the Arboretum work to maintain the trees keep the garden beds growing. This includes gardening in the beds and keeping the space as a positive place for our residents. The **Shade Tree Nursery**, located just north of the Dumont Arboretum along the railroad tracks is growing trees for our community. Volunteers can work to weed, water, mulch, and maintain the space providing the trees with a safe space to grow. We also organize events such as concerts, and lectures, and special activities for the children of our community. We are always open to new ideas and welcome volunteers who want to join in.

The **Adopt-A-Tree** program plants trees on borough land and we take requests through our website and at our community events. This fall we will plant 15 trees around town. The Tree Nursery program is slightly different in that residents can request trees that will be planted on their private property. The Shade Tree grows our own trees in the nursery, whereas the Adopt-a-Trees are purchased from local nurseries. If you adopt a tree through either program, you must commit to caring for the tree. This means that for the first growing season, you have to water the newly planted tree, every week, if it's not raining. The **Heritage Tree program** identifies those trees that have grown with our community to become mature trees. We are their stewards and responsible to maintain and protect them. Heritage Trees have vital role in the health, vitality, and longevity of a community. More information about these programs are in this newsletter and on our website.

The Shade Tree Commission was proud to sponsor the summer concert series **Twilight at the Gazebo** again this July. The series brought our community together to enjoy local talent under the stars. We also were prominent at **Dumont Day 2021** where the community gathers to celebrate our town. It was a glorious weather day where many of our residents came to Memorial Park to spend a beautiful afternoon. Please continue to enjoy, respect, and cherish the trees.



Dumont Shade Tree Important Dates in 2021

In 2017 the DSTC established a tree nursery for the benefit of Dumont residents. This year marks the first season that some of the trees are ready for transplanting. Dumont residents submitted requests to be part of this inaugural planting and will receive a free tree to be planted by the Shade Tree



Commission. We will review the available trees and recommend the right tree for the right spot in their yard. Trees that are available include: flowering dogwood, washington hawthorn, star magnolia, eastern red cedar, pekin lilac tree, tulip tree, and bur oak. These saplings were raised in the

invasion is through education and creating an army of people to SQUASH (kill) these flies when you see them. Refer to



Dumont Day 2021– Bricks for the Arboretum

These eight bricks were purchased over the summer 2021. We thank those residents who purchased a brick. These are newly installed in front of the Gazebo as part of our Fall 2021 campaign.

Take a walk through the Dumont Arboretum and as you pass through the Gazebo area, you will see how many residents have participated in the program. Proceeds fund the Shade Tree Scholarship for a graduating senior from Dumont High school as well as other leafy projects around town.



Adopt-a-Tree Program || Free for Dumont Residents

Homeowners can apply to the Adopt-A-Tree program at any time. The Shade Tree commission will purchase and plant trees at no cost to the homeowner. Adopt-A-Tree is for planting along the curb as a Borough Tree. Planting trees in the Borough Right of Way is the sole responsibility of the DSTC. Property Owners may apply to the Dumont Shade Tree Commission to voluntarily plant a Tree or Trees in the ROW abutting the Private Property. Once planted, the homeowner must agree to water and watch over the new trees.

After applying to participate in the Adopt-a-Tree program we will inspect the location near your home for just the right tree; we will look for underground sprinklers, overhead wire locations, nearest trees, adjacent sidewalks, driveway or other hard surfaces, and any structures. This will help us determine the right tree to plant. Utility mark-outs will also be ordered prior to planting.

Generally planting is done once in the Spring and once in the Fall. When the trees are planted, they are mulched properly "like a donut or dish, not a volcano!" and a watering bag is provided, so that the homeowner can fill it with a hose or watering can (1-3 times per week, more during the first hot or dry summer). Then the water will drip slowly down to the roots to encourage a healthy start to the tree. Prunus virginiana (Chokecherry)

You might find these planted on streets with sidewalks, or under wires because they will not get too tall. Trees are planted with root guards along sidewalks, which will prevent lifting as the trees grow.





Platanus occidentalis (American Sycamore)

How high does the sycamore grow? --Colors of the Wind

Noted for distinctive mottled bark at maturity, this native large tree will provide valuable shade, O2 and shelter.



Tilia (Linden or in the UK: Lime Tree)

A favorite medium-large shade tree, with pollen loved by bees, but does not trigger human allergies!

Attractive heart-shaped leaves and branching habit.

Carpinus caroliniana (Hornbeam)

This small-medium sized understory tree is in the birch family, a deciduous hardwood shade tree that's native to eastern North America.

The Dumont Shade Tree Commission now has among its members a Licensed Tree Expert (LTE). What does it take to become an LTE? Ray had to study for and then pass the rigorous written and field tests. These comprehensive tests are a comprehensive review of New Jersey trees. Ray had to be able to identify and name

hundreds of trees by their bark, leaves, nuts, and features. In addition, he had to know their common as well as scientific names. Now that Ray is a certified LTE, NJ LTE #710. This will help in the work we do as a Shade Tree Commission and lend credibility for managing and protecting the trees in Dumont.

From the President's Desk:

The thing about learning new things is that for a long time you feel like you are just putting on new skates while everyone else at the rink looks like Peggy Fleming. You slip and slide until you get your feet under you, but for a long time you still feel lost. Then you see a new person strap their skates and finally feel like you have indeed learned how to skate. Every one of the Shade Tree Commissioners felt just like that, me included, when we first joined the DSTC. We didn't know enough about trees except that we knew they were important and valuable and beautiful. So, I decided that if I was going to make a difference and really offer something to the community, I should join the ranks of real arborists and study the science of trees, their lives, lifecycle, and threats. NJ established the Board of Tree Experts that sets the guidelines for arborists. I enrolled with Rutgers Profession Ted Szczawinski, learned as much as I could, and added to that my knowledge from 15 years as a commissioner. I passed the written and field test giving me the distinction of Licensed Tree Expert (NJ LTE #710). What I learned during this process, aside from a lot more about trees than I knew before, is that there is so much more to learn. I am just at the beginning of a journey that will take me as far as I want to go. Trees are an integral part of the ecosystem, intimately linked to all the other parts; bees and butterflies, fungi and field mice, and humans. We can't have a sustainable healthy planet suitable for people if we don't recognize the role every creature plays in the cycle. As a Licensed Tree Expert I can more clearly see the role trees play and the role we as humans play in this process. And I can see how we can do better. How we NEED to do better. Dumont Tree Ordinance:



In continuing the effort to protect the trees in our town, the Borough of Dumont has an amended Shade Tree ordinance; Ordinance 1503 6/21/16. By law, any resident must apply for a permit-\$25.00 fee —through the Building Department before ANY tree greater than 6 inches in caliper or 10 feet in height can be removed within the Borough of Dumont. This ordinance applies to trees on private

property and to town trees. Following the application for a permit, the Dumont Shade Tree Commission will inspect the tree to certify the jurisdiction of the tree and determine if the tree is on private property and therefore can proceed. Failure to apply for a permit prior to removing a tree will result in a fine. Removing or damaging a borough tree will result in penalties. Our goal is to preserve the canopy in Dumont. The canopy protects all Dumont homes during winter and summer by providing shade and absorbing water.
